Glasses of champagne and light hors d'oeuvres were shared in celebration of this beautiful addition to our museum grounds in honor of the life, the spirit, and love of Mrs. Shelton. From the dedication:

"For those of us who had the blessing of knowing Kay, we know she wasn't just a resident of Morattico — she was Morattico. Kay spent her entire life growing up right here in this little riverside village, surrounded by the people, places, and memories that shaped who she was. She loved this place deeply — its beauty, its people, its stories. And she carried that love in her heart every day.

It feels only fitting that the playground we dedicate today stands as a tribute not only to Kay's life but also to the generations of children and families who have made their

own memories here — who have fished off the docks, played tag in the grass, and chased fireflies as the sun set over the river.

This playground isn't just swings and slides. It's a symbol — a reminder of what community means. It's a place where laughter echoes, friendships begin, and stories are written that will be told for years to come. Just as Kay's life touched so many of ours, may this playground continue to touch the lives of those who come after us.

As we dedicate this space, I'm reminded of the words from Matthew 19:14: "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." Kay had that same kind of welcoming spirit — one that embraced others with love, patience, and joy. I think she would smile knowing that children will gather here, play here, and grow here in the light of that same love.

Kay loved the simple joys — family, the comfort of familiar faces, and the beauty of a Morattico sunset. May every laugh that rings out here remind us of her spirit.

May every child who plays here grow up knowing the warmth of community that Kay helped create. And may we all carry forward her legacy of kindness, connection, and love for this little village, with a big heart, by the water."

## New Museum Acquisition!

Friend, neighbor and museum member George Shelton recently made a donation of the original bell previously rung by Amelia Lankford at the Frog Pond School! George and Kay had the bell at their home for 50 years (or more) and wanted the museum to have it.

The Frog Pond School was a frame schoolhouse located at the corner of Morattico Road and Mulberry Creek Road and was attended by residents of Morattico in the 1930's and 1940's. The colloquial name, Frog Pond School, came from the pond at the rear of the building. (Information from Morattico.org). We are excited

to have this new amazing and historical artifact!
